Where to build Rain Gardens

Always direct water collection a minimum of 3-10' from any patio or building foundation. Placing your rain garden long ways across the top of a slope will allow the maximum rainwater infiltration into your yard.

OVERFLOW

Dependent on your soil's drainage abilities, overflow or outlet pipes that connect to drains may be necessary to prevent overland flow in major rain events.

CONNECT YOUR GUTTERS

Run a large width (i.e. 3") pipe from your rain gutter downspout to the start of a narrow gravel-filled trench or dry streambed


MAKE YOUR 'POND'

Dig out an absorption 'pond' (aka underground reservoir) a minimum of 1-2' deep. And fill the bottom with 6" deep of gravel. Dig the pond long ways across the top of a slight slope if possible

SIZE

Dig them any size! Every little bit helps. Here's some suggested ones:

- 2 x 3.5' is a decent starter size
- 5' x 12' is shown in design plan

California Hairgrass (Deschampsia cespitosa ssp. holciformis)

Blue Wild Rye (*Elymus glaucus*)

Native Fescues (Festuca spp.)

Deer Grass (Muhlenbergia patens)

Common Rush (Juncus patens)

Soft Rush (Juncus effuses)

Meadow Sedge (Carex pansa)

Red Larkspur (Delphinium nudicaule)

Scarlet Monkeyflower (Erythranthe cardinalis)

Western Vervain (Verbena lasiostachys)

Western Columbine (Aquilegia formosa)

Narrowleaf Blue-eyed Grass (Sisyrinchium angustifolium)

Yellow-eyed Grass (Sisyrinchium californicum)

Self Heal (Prunella vulgaris)

Mountain Mint (*Pycnanthemum californicum*)

Horsetail (Equisetum telmateia ssp. braunii)

Lady Fern (Athyrium filix-femina)

Showy Milkweed (Asclepias speciosa)

Narrowleaf Milkweed (Asclepias fascicularis)

Yarrow (Achillea millefolium)

California fuchsia (*Epilobium canum*)

Native Irises

California poppy (direct seed)

More recommendations (by location) from www.californialandscapedesign.org:

FOR THE BOTTOM OF THE SWALE:

- Yerba Mansa (*Anemopsis californica*)
- Santa Barbara Sedge (Carex barbarea)
- California Field Sedge (Carex praegracilis) good near inflows for erosion control
- Salt Grass (*Distichlis spicata*)
- Rosemallow (*Hibiscus lasiecarpus /syn. H.californica*)
- Pacific Silverweed (Salicornia sp.)
- Native Juncus sp.

FOR THE SIDES OF THE SWALE:

- Blue Hibiscus (Alyogyne huegelii) upper sides
- Seep Monkey Flower (*Mimulus guttatus*) -mid point or higher as long as roots access moist areas
- Mangle Dulce (Maytenus phyllanthoides)
- Native Scirpus sp. where it doesn't get covered in water prolonged periods
- Fairy Lily (Zephyranthes candida) mid or high without lots of standing water

ANYWHERE IN THE SWALE:

- Tall Sedge (Carex appressa)
- Foothill/Berkeley Sedge (Carex tumilicola)
- Giant Chain Fern (Woodwardia fimbriata)
